UTAH BOARD OF EDUCATION APPROVES SUU'S FIRST DOCTORATE PROGRAM

For the first time in its history, Southern Utah University will offer a doctorate-level program. The Utah Board of Higher Education gave its final approval Friday, October 30th on SUU's new Doctor of Psychology in Clinical Psychology (Psy.D.). The program will prepare students to practice psychotherapy and psychological testing.

"When our first doctorate program begins in the Fall of 2022, it'll be Southern Utah University's 125th year of providing higher education in our region. That's a significant achievement in our history," said SUU President Scott L Wyatt. "Just as important, this new program will help solve a problem found in rural Utah and throughout the country

- the availability of mental health practitioners."

The new doctorate program must still receive final approval from the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities, SUU's regional accreditation highereducation agency.

This will be the only Doctorate of Psychology (Psy.D.) program focusing on mental health offered in the state of Utah. It differs from a Ph.D. degree which places a greater emphasis on research rather than specifically training professionals for practical application.

"This program will make a significant difference in people's lives," said SUU

Chris Crawford, an SUU HSS alumni, currently works as a Foreign Service Officer stationed in Lyon, France. He graduated from SUU with a BA in Criminal Justice. When asked about what he learned at SUU, Chris replied, "My time at SUU was where I really learned how to learn, and it gave me the confidence to know I could achieve my dreams". He stated that clubs, being an SUU Ambassador, and student government, all helped him get to where he is today. Chris wanted to take a year off after completing school to live overseas and learn a new language. He ended up joining the Utah Army National Guard and living in Iraq before taking the LSAT and working toward being a Foreign



Service Officer. With a 3-6% acceptance rate, becoming a Foreign Service Officer is no small feat. Chris shared that he and his family move to new countries every few years, something that they love, but that is also very difficult. He has lived in Sydney, Australia; Paris, France; East Timor; Kabul; Afghanistan; and Lyon, France. Chris' job in Lyon includes many things - from helping a restaurant get permission to open a new store, to arranging for an American author to speak with high school students and introduce them to a writing program, and even to reporting on French film festivals and their response to COVID-19. He has also been responsible for issuing visas, finding housing for new diplomats, scheduling travel for the General Consul, and much more.

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
